## Agricultural and rural advisory services - challenges for Eastern European partner countries

Policy recommendations built upon the observation from the PRO AKIS inventory of European AKIS(agriculture knowledge, information and innovation system) by Prof. Andrea Knierim & Ulrike Knuth





#### How to interact with and govern increasingly pluralistic agricultural advisory systems?

#### Public actors need to develop competencies and methodologies for an diagnosis in their region

- identifies and describes the relevant actors (education, research, advisory services, public and private knowledge providers and users etc.
- recognizes strengths and weaknesses
- · searches for gaps and missing interactions among them
- Special attention should be paid to the divergent knowledge needs within the group of farm managers regarding farm size and education level
- Small scale farmers need public support to fulfill their knowledge and advisory needs





### Public actors need to provide a minimum advisory services' infrastructure or

#### public support of private advisory services/consultants

- privatization is trend for advisory services, but public administration often has to maintain certain advisory functions such as for environmental topics or farm investment/development esp. in regions with a high number of small scale farms
- minimum infrastructures and support should be related to the most important gaps or weaknesses within a specific AKIS
- public support is necessary to have living knowledge flows between research and farmers, esp. small-scale and/or resource-poor farmers
- Public support for well-functioning knowledge flows within a region can be realized by a set of governance options including
  - advisory projects (e.g. monitor farms in Scotland),
  - financial support for farmers to use private advisory services or
  - policy-induced innovation or
  - rural networks or maintenance of experimental stations





## The support/initiation of rural multi-actor networks is a potential alternative to classical advisory services and can increase interaction within a regional AKIS

- Multi-actor networks are a successful (new) advisory format
- Networks have the potential to fill gaps within an AKIS, especially in rather 'weak' AKIS with low level of interaction and/or public AKIS infrastructure
- policy-induced learning networks should be open to include a diversity of knowledge providers in the region
- Advisory service providers (public or private) of a region are able to take up the following functions in networks:
  - Clarify knowledge needs of farmers, Brokering, facilitating
  - Promote learning and dissemination
  - Capitalize data, information or knowledge, Monitoring
- Networks should promote collective learning processes, e.g. leveraged by demonstrations, and provide repeated opportunities to experience and observe
- Trust among actors is a main driver for successful learning





## The financial support/funding of rural multi-actor networks merits specific attention from an institutional perspective:

- funding schemes will impact the composition of actors
- there is a risk to support 'closed shops"
- to provide a long-term funding perspective has the potential to build up new trustful relations
- funding 'projects' rather than networks tends to strengthens the output side and weakens the relation component
- In order to enable advisors to fulfill their emerging roles in networks and to assure the quality of advisory services in region, support in training/education and the smart development of certification schemes are necessary:
- EUFRAS and CECRA have started on the EU level
